Physicians have the highest suicide rate of any profession.

Alabama Ranked Sixth in the Number of Patients that are Delaying Care



This pandemic has made telehealth more important than ever, enabling access to care to patients whose needs can be met remotely. State will publish K-12 school COVID-19 cases soon



Alabama will soon start publishing data on new cases of COVID-19 in K-12 public schools, State Superintendent Eric Mackey said Thursday.

Mackey did not say exactly when that data will be published, but said once it's available it would be updated weekly.

"Even though we've had very few students who have had serious complications or even symptoms, we feel like we need to let parents know when and if a certain part of the state or a certain school system (has) positive cases," Mackey said.

The Alabama Department of Public Health will be creating the website where case numbers will be published, Mackey said. The information won't specify if the cases are in teachers or students.

AstraZeneca still aiming to complete vaccine by year-end, despite trial pause



AstraZeneca CEO Pascal Soriot says the company is still aiming to complete development of its vaccine with the University of Oxford by the end of this year, despite pausing phase 3 trials due to a participant falling ill, Bloomberg reports.

The state of play: The person is suspected to be suffering from "neurological symptoms consistent with a rare but serious spinal inflammatory disorder called transverse myelitis," according to STAT News. It's not clear if the condition is related to the vaccine.

People who rely on USPS for prescription drugs may have experienced "significant" delivery delays



A <u>report</u> released Wednesday by two senators found "significant and increasing delays" in the mail delivery of prescription drugs under the tenure of Postmaster General Louis DeJoy.

The lawmakers in charge of the investigation said some of the nation's largest pharmacies told them they were experiencing, on average, delivery delays of 18-32%, meaning deliveries that would normally take 1-2 days would instead take 3-4 days, the report concluded.
