CMS issues state guidance on advancing value in Medicaid









The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services today released guidance for states on opportunities to advance value-based care in Medicaid, which reviews available federal authorities and "lessons learned" from early state and federal experiences.

"Our health care providers need Medicare, Medicaid and private insurance payers to work in tandem with one another, and I am calling on our state partners to use this guidance to develop a plan to improve quality for their Medicaid beneficiaries by advancing value-based care in their own programs," said CMS Administrator Seema Verma.

Governor Kay Ivey on Monday morning issued a <u>State of Emergency</u> ahead of potential severe weather affecting Alabama this week.

"Bad weather is nothing to take lightly," Ivey stated. "Earlier today, I issued a State of Emergency because those on the Gulf Coast know a flood and heavy rains can be just as deadly as tropical winds. We pray that Sally doesn't do any harm, but we must be prepared just in case. As your governor, you have my assurance that every resource will be available if we need it. Be safe, Alabama."

Preventive health care has declined during pandemic



The New York Times (9/11, Kliff) reported, "When the coronavirus pandemic hit, Americans vastly scaled back their preventive health care, and there is little sign that this deferred care will be made up." In April, "vaccinations dropped by nearly 60 percent...and almost no one was getting a colonoscopy, according to new data from the nonprofit Health Care Cost Institute." The data "shows a consistent pattern, whether it was prostate screenings or contraceptives: Preventive care declined drastically this spring and, as of late June, had not yet recovered to normal levels."
